

SAFETY ALERT BULLETIN



On November 22, 2006, at approximately 12:50 a.m., a section foreman was caught between an Eimco ram car and a feeder. The foreman was working approximately three feet in front of the Stamler feeder and the loaded ram car was parked about 10 feet away. The brakes on the ram car leaked off and allowed the car to roll down a slight grade entrapping the foreman's lower legs between the ram car and the feeder. The foreman received first aid at the scene, then transported to Lee Memorial Hospital and transported by Med Flight on to another Hospital. The foreman received extensive crushing injuries to his left leg and his right lower leg was amputated by hospital personnel. Immediate, effective first aid, in all likelihood, saved the foreman's life.

- Mobile equipment shall be maintained in safe operating condition.
- When parking rubber tired equipment, always park in a manner to prevent unexpected movement.
- Avoid placing yourself between equipment and pinch point locations.
- Always take first aid training seriously as you never know when effective treatment may save your life or a coworker's life.
